
HARLESTONE NHP SURVEY 2020





Summary

Harlestone residents show a strong attachment to their local parish. Over 80% of those surveyed mentioned multiple things that they enjoy most about living in the village. Over two thirds of respondents have lived in the village for over 10 years and 61% regard it as their lifetime home.




A notable feature of the composition of respondents and those within their households is that 37% are retired or semi-retired. This is a high proportion compared with the approximate overall UK retired population (18% aged 65+) and it informs the general theme of survey responses, which highlight some key priorities.




One key priority is to protect Harlestone's open and green spaces. 92% of respondents say that protecting existing open spaces from development is very important and 95% would welcome a Neighbourhood Plan policy that seeks to designate and protect areas of local green space. 93% also feel that preventing Harlestone coalescing with the urban areas is very important.

Respondents are generally opposed to development in the parish, with 55% saying they would like to see no new homes being built in Harlestone. Yet there is broad support for conversion of agricultural or commercial buildings (67%). Whilst there is some support for small scale development, 83% of respondents feel that any new housing development should reflect the character of the village. The vast majority also support the inclusion of the following policies in the Neighbourhood Plan, to ensure the parish maintains its character: prescribing the materials and design of external alterations to existing homes in the village (85%), focusing on preserving the existing street scene (94%) and preserving minimum or existing space between neighbouring houses (94%).



Respondents say that the main issues of concern associated with transport within the local area are the speed of vehicle traffic (84% 'very important'), the volume of traffic through Lower Harlestone (69% 'very important') and Upper Harlestone (59% 'very important') and conserving & protecting the grass roadside verges (64% 'very important').




Respondents also expressed concerns regarding the volume and speed of traffic and cyclists on local roads when asked to give details on what they like least about living in the parish. 17% say that this is the aspect of living in Harlestone that they like the least, making up over half of the responses given.


Respondents indicated that the two most important parking related issues are increasing or improving parking at Harlestone Firs (45% 'very important') and providing signage to discourage parking on the grass verges (51% 'very important'). There is also a fair amount of opposition to increasing or improving parking for visitors in the village (58% 'not important').

Respondents are generally supportive of various renewable energy projects in the parish but over 70% are opposed to wind or solar panel farms. Given that a large majority of surveyed residents want to protect the local views and open spaces, it appears they are opposed to these projects because of the potential impact on the local landscape.

Meanwhile, 77% of respondents do want to promote the use of renewable energy solutions on individual dwellings. The most popular added comment (7%) on renewable energy projects indicated that all domestic installations should be unobtrusive and sympathetic.




The features of Harlestone that respondents appreciate the most are the rural surroundings (97%) and historic character of the village (97%). The clear theme of the survey responses is that residents are opposed to any development that will change or diminish these features. This message is emphasised by the large majority of respondents, who say that it is 'very important' to protect the views into and from the village (92%) and protect the historic character of Harlestone village (93%).




Full Survey Results

Household Demographics



4 out of 5 respondents (80%) live in households in Harlestone which are owner occupied.

A relatively high proportion of respondents (37%) are retired or semi-retired, compared with the approximate overall UK retired population (18% aged 65+).





A sizeable proportion of respondents (45%) plan to stay in the village for the next 15 years. It is highly likely that this group have a keen interest in any future development plans.











Housing Needs & Development




Respondents are largely opposed to new homes being built in Harlestone. 55% would like to see no new homes built. There is some support for building single homes (36%) or sites of 2-9 homes (24%). Almost no respondents are in favour of sites for more than 10 homes. Two thirds of respondents think that conversion of agricultural or commercial buildings in the village is appropriate.




Around 25% of respondents predict that they will need a different form of housing in the parish in the next 10 years. The rest either expected to need no change in housing or they gave no response.




Over half of respondents could modify or adapt their home to meet their future needs whilst almost 30% did not believe it was possible. 


Views, Landscape, Open Spaces and Biodiversity




A large majority of respondents think that protecting local views (92%), open spaces (92% from development, 87% between the village clusters), areas for nature conservation (86%) and keeping the parish separate from the urban area (95%) is 'very important'.


All of the suggested additional features, which are mostly aimed at maintaining Harlestone's current landscape, have a high level of approval amongst respondents (70%+).








Renewable Energy



Wind and solar panel farms are much less popular than other renewable energy projects among respondents. This is most likely because they could have a negative impact on local landscape and views.

Over 70% of respondents are opposed to both wind and solar panel farms in the parish. All other renewable energy projects have more than 55% support except for domestic wind powered generators, which divide local opinion.












